Polystyrene Ban: Ordinance No. 2019-20 requiring the use of non-polystyrene food service and packaging products that are reusable, recyclable or compostable.

Why ban Polystyrene? To improve the environment in Barrington and the health, safety and welfare of its residents. Polystyrene is not easily recycled and when littered or discarded, creates undesirable impacts on water quality, stormwater and wildlife.



Who is affected? • Food and retail

establishments including caterers and food trucks • Barrington facilities, operations and Town-sponsored and permitted events • Schools and daycare providers (public and private) • Sellers or distributors of packing materials (offering for sale or compensation, donating used packing materials under subsection (c)(3), re-using/repackaging, and receiving shipments within the town) • Clubs, organizations and non-profits serving food on premises.

Prohibited items as of January 1, 2020

All polystyrene food and beverage containers, cups, bowls, cartons, plates, trays, coolers, ice chests, lids, straws, stirrers, forks, knives, spoons and other single use items. These items are usually labeled with a recycling code Expanded Polystyrene (EP) #1, #3 and #6.

The Fire Department placed an order for a **100-foot Aerial Fire apparatus**. The vehicle is equipped with a 1250 gallon per minute fire pump, a 100-foot aluminum ladder as well as a full complement of aluminum ground ladders. The truck also carries 1000 feet of five-inch supply hose that is used to supply water from a hydrant to a fire pumper. The truck also carries 500 gallons of water and 30 gallons of Class "A" Firefighting Foam. The vehicle is designed to carry four firefighters with their Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus, hand tools and extrication equipment. The Aerial ladder will replace a 2001 75-foot quint fire apparatus.

Reorganization created new Planning, Building & Resiliency Department.

New **Middle School** opened in the fall, a state-of-art educational facility with sophisticated security features, for our students and community.

Opioid Overdose Solution Grant: Barrington did a town-wide mailing of a "Community Resources" brochure and have distributed and made available Deterra pouches, which are used to dispose of unwanted medications in residential trash. Pouches are used along with disposal of expired medications at the Public Safety Building and available at all Town facilities.

Resilient Rhody, Municipal Resilience Program (MRP): The Towns of Barrington and Warren submitted a joint proposal and were selected as first round participants in the State's MRP Program created to address climate adaptation. The Towns collaborated to host a Community Resilience Building (CRB) Workshop to further the communities' ongoing efforts to study and plan for the impacts of climate change. The outcome of the CRB Workshop was a prioritized list of climate adaptation actions that have the potential to reduce the impact of hazards and increase resilience for Barrington, Warren and the region. Having successfully completed the CRB process, Barrington has been designated as a *Resilient Rhody Municipality*, enabling the Town to apply for dedicated State funding to support climate adaptation projects.

The Town installed a **splash pad** and **shade structure** at Police Cove Park. Children can activate jets of streaming water from both the ground and



overhead tubing sculpture from a push of a button. Adults can sit at park benches or picnic tables under the shade structure and experience the beautiful view of the Barrington River.

The State finished the **Nayatt Road Reconstruction Project**, including new sidewalks from Rumstick Road to Broadview Drive.

Work started on improvements to **Latham Park**, to include a new playground (will be finished in spring 2020).

New sidewalks built on Middle Highway from the Bike Path to Seven Oaks Drive and from St. Andrew's Farm to Sherwood Lane, as part of a Safe Routes to School Project administered by the State.

2nd Annual **Day of Caring:** 100 volunteers participated in the afternoon event. Projects: nine private properties, prepped field at Barrington Farm School, planted seven trees and three shrubs

2019 Office of the Tax Assessor 2020

The median sale price of a single family home in the Town of Barrington in 2018 was \$475,000 (based on 291 sales). The median price of a single family home in 2019 currently stands at \$460,000 (or a 3.16% decrease in value) and that is based on 302 sales with six weeks left in the calendar year. The range in sale prices in 2019 has been \$165,000 to \$2,800,000. To date, there have been 30 sales (or 10.71% of all sales) below \$225,000 (\$225,000 is currently considered "Affordable" in this market). There have been six foreclosures in Town in 2019, which is one less than the same time frame in 2018. The drop in value in the motor vehicles is fourfold, this year the State has; reduced the NADA value by 15%, reduced the value on motor vehicles 16 years and older to \$500, reduced the tax rate to \$35.00 and increased the phase-out to \$3,000. The motor vehicle phase-out is scheduled to continue through 2024 at which point there should be no more motor vehicle tax.

Harbormaster

During the 2019 season, the Harbor Patrol responded to many calls for assistance from boaters in the Barrington waters. In addition, there were many warnings and citations issued to boaters who engaged in dangerous or unlawful activity as part of our effort to encourage safe boating.



The Harbormaster and the Harbor Patrol spent many hours on the water and are always looking out for the safety of all boaters. The Harbor Patrol is especially observant of children and young adults who may be less experienced on the water. This population is most vulnerable on the water and may find themselves in dangerous situations before they realize it. The mix of watercrafts moving on the water range from kayaks, calmly paddling along, to jet-skis, powerful motorboats and sailboats from 20 to 50 feet.

We have added paddleboards to the list of entry level vessels on the water. We have found that often times these entry level boaters do not recognize the requirements of wearing a life jacket and don't always recognize the pull of the current. Paddleboarders do not need a license but like all boaters they should complete the boating safety course offered by the Coast Guard Auxiliary. A basic precept of safety on a paddleboard is always to wear a PFD (life jacket).



The Harbormaster in conjuction with the Harbor Commission spent the past year locating, identifying, and marking over 25 Public Points of Access. This was a great achievement that will be ongoing until all Public Points of Acess are identified.

The Harbor Patrol has a responsibility to patrol all of Barrington's waters from the Barrington River to Bullocks Cove and all points in

between. We are also responsible for the utilization of assigned mooring spaces, to oversee recreational water sports and all boating activities in Barrington.

DPW Annual Report for Fiscal Year 2018-2019



Public Works is responsible for maintenance of all Town owned roadways (approximately 90 miles), sidewalks, buildings, parks, Town Beach, school (grounds only) and athletic fields, sanitary sewer system including 15 pump stations, snow and ice removal from public ways, street sweeping, storm drainage system and

management of the refuse and recycling vendor including operation of the recycling center and Walker Farm compost site.

The DPW received 2,728 calls for services for FY19 including the following:



Tree Maintenance: 440 (tree removal, trimmed, stumps chipped, inspection)

Asphalt Repair/Patching: 475 square yards

Street Sweeping: 150 miles total

Drainage: 673 catch basins cleaned

or repaired

Brush Chipping: 1,004 requests from

residents

Reconstructed approximately 400 linear feet of the Mathewson Road Seawall

Constructed approximately 450 linear feet of timber quard rail/fencing

The DPW managed the contractor for the closure of Landfill No. 4 adjacent from Upland Way. The DPW developed and managed two road resurfacing contracts during this period. Sewer Division staff worked with a local contractor on the emergency repair of a failed valve on the force main from the Police Cove Pump Station which due to the timely response, prevented an overflow of sanitary sewage to the Barrington River.

The Town hosted a community shredding event in October.





- Town's Twitter account topped 650 followers in 2019.









CARBON MONOXIDE SAFETY TIPS

- CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- Choose a CO alarm that has the label of a recognized testing laboratory.
- Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- 1 fthe CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel.
- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.

Tax bills are mailed annually in July and may be paid in full or in quarterly installments due on the detailed schedule below.
